

WHO'S LOBBYING WHO IN BC?

Monthly Snapshot – July 2026

The following is a brief summary of new Registration Returns activated or re-activated between July 1 and July 31, 2026, under BC's *Lobbyists Transparency Act*.

1. Colin Aitchison and Tyson Brown, consultant lobbyists with Enterprise Canada, are lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of HealthPro Procurement Services Inc. regarding working with the B.C. government to bolster post-COVID-19 health care procurement, including building safe domestic supply chains, and meeting with government to discuss how innovative B.C.-based businesses could overcome barriers to innovation, in order to spur economic growth in B.C.
2. Michael Bailey, a consultant lobbyist with Western Policy Consultants Inc., is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of Qualico Developments (Vancouver) Inc. regarding support for securing Federal infrastructure funding from the Building Committee Strong Fund, and advocating for WSA approval for Qualico's development in Surrey West Clayton of 7,100 residential units, for the issuance of WSA permits for the Surrey West Clayton neighbourhood development, and for a land swap with Surrey School District to provide land needed for a school in the Grandview Area 5 neighbourhood.
3. Berit Beattie, a consultant lobbyist with CSG Canadian Strategy Group LP, is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of PC Urban Properties Corp. regarding workforce housing projects in Vancouver for essential workers, including health care and first responders, and potential provincial policy or cost-relief measures that could support the affordability and delivery of this housing model.

4. Justin Bérubé, a consultant lobbyist with Falkirk Consulting, is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of Iron Workers Local 97 Apprenticeship and Training Society to advocate for the integration of skilled trades workforce capacity, apprenticeship programs, and Indigenous employment partnerships into major project approval and permitting processes under BC's major projects, and to provide policy and program recommendations regarding BC's Critical Minerals Strategy, specifically the alignment of trades workforce readiness and construction capacity with critical minerals project timelines.
5. Justin Bérubé, a consultant lobbyist with Falkirk Consulting, is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of Northisle Copper and Gold Inc. to engage the Government of British Columbia on the North Island Project's regulatory roadmap, infrastructure needs, and alignment with provincial priorities for critical minerals, clean energy, and regional economic development.
6. Wesley-Ryan Boyd, a consultant lobbyist with Crestview Strategy Inc., is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of 3M Canada with respect to communications with managers of integrated health authorities, university hospital centres, and other similar organizations to introduce the company and its products and services; engaging on matters relating to policies and legislative proposals addressing public health and safety, including population-level harms; engaging in relation to British Columbia's COVID-19 pandemic response and recovery, including personal protective equipment supply chain management and future emergency preparedness; enhancing the safety of motorists on British Columbia roadways through available 3M technologies and programs focused on road, road user, and road worker safety; enhancing workplace safety through the introduction of available 3M technologies and personal safety devices; and meetings and communications with public office holders to present 3M energy technology solutions to reduce the weight of power transmission lines, increase the efficiency and capacity of transmission and distribution systems, while keeping existing infrastructure.
7. Greg D'Avignon, a consultant lobbyist with CSG Canadian Strategy Group LP, is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of GFL Environmental Inc. to apprise government officials of the breadth and depth of the assets, supply chain support services, and delivery that GFL undertakes with regard to EPR and waste diversion in BC related to solid waste, and the efficiency of its operations, including ways to support and improve the effectiveness of the province's goals for waste diversion and environmental management to the benefit of, and in support of, the Environmental Management Act and the affordability of municipalities and taxpayers.

8. Marcel Desmond, a consultant lobbyist with Rubicon Strategy Inc., is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of Indivior Canada Ltd. regarding current regulations and policies related to access to opioid addiction treatments, encouraging the government to utilize the most up-to-date options for British Columbians experiencing mental health and addictions challenges, and presenting the latest effective, evidence-based solutions to address challenges in the health care system for people with opioid addiction.
9. Yash Dogra, a consultant lobbyist with Burson, is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of Tantalus Systems Corp. regarding building and nurturing relationships with provincial, municipal, and regulatory stakeholders in B.C. to align Tantalus with policy priorities and secure broader support for leveraging its solutions, while cultivating allies who can champion and amplify Tantalus' value proposition with local decision-makers and LDCs through direct engagement, letters of support, or earned media opportunities.
10. Christopher Fernando, a consultant lobbyist with Slate Strategies Ltd., is lobbying public office holders at the British Columbia Housing Management Commission on behalf of Efficiency Capital (EC) Inc. regarding energy efficiency and decarbonization retrofits in British Columbia's public and social housing sector, including the delivery and financing of building retrofits through an Energy-as-a-Service model in which a private provider funds, installs, and maintains energy efficiency and building system upgrades and is repaid through the resulting energy savings, as well as the eligibility and design of provincial energy efficiency and building decarbonization programs, funding and incentive structures for social and public housing providers, and procurement pathways for retrofit projects at provincially owned or funded housing and facilities.
11. Aaron Freeman, a consultant lobbyist with Pivot Strategic Consulting Inc., is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of Environmental Defense Fund regarding the strengthening of regulations governing oil and gas methane emissions.
12. Shannon Greer, a consultant lobbyist with New West Public Affairs, is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of Bri-mor Developments regarding exploring ways to support the province's affordable housing objectives by identifying practical policy, partnership, and investment opportunities that can help increase housing supply, improve affordability, and respond to local community needs.
13. Beatriz Grigsby-Larson, a consultant lobbyist with Global Public Affairs Inc., is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of Wine Growers British Columbia Society regarding

Direct sale of Wine above a wholesale price level; government assistance for crop damaged caused by climate change resulting in freeze damage to wine buds; improved Agriculture Land Commission Policies; modernizing BC Industry Licensing Regime; modernizing Sales Agreement between wine producers and the Liquor Distribution Branch; offsetting impacts of Federal Excise Tax on support programs; placement of wine on Public Liquor Store Shelves through the Liquor Distribution Board; regulatory Changes to Temporary Expanded Service Areas for BC Wineries; Responsible Consumption of Wine Campaign; seeking assistance for climate related damage to grapes and vineyards and consequential short crops; and safeguarding existing industry support programs offered through the Liquor Distribution Branch and related Ministries of Agriculture, Finance and Solicitor General.

14. David Gulliver, a consultant lobbyist with Enterprise Canada, is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of Kids Help Phone to educate the Government on Kids Help Phone's efforts to provide mental health services for Canadians and to seek opportunities to work with the Government to advance mental health initiatives and supports in BC.
15. David Gulliver, a consultant lobbyist with Enterprise Canada, is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of the British Columbia Association of Community Health Centres regarding opportunities to strengthen public health care by expanding the community health centre model of primary care delivery throughout the province.
16. Sebastian Jedrzejewski, a consultant lobbyist with StrategyCorp Inc., is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of Tudor Gold Corp. regarding the engagement on the preservation of Tudor Gold Corp.'s mineral tenures at the Treaty Creek Goldstorm Deposit.
17. Sebastian Jedrzejewski and Natalie Dash, consultant lobbyists with StrategyCorp Inc., are lobbying public office holders at the Ministry of Housing and Municipal Affairs and the Office of the Premier on behalf of High Art Capital Inc. regarding the policy design, implementation, and participation requirements of the Canada-BC Partnership on Condo Conversion program.
18. Mark Jiles, a consultant lobbyist with Bluestone Consulting Inc, is lobbying public office holders at the Ministry of Agriculture and Food on behalf of British Columbia Blueberry Industry Council regarding the growing demand for healthy Canadian bee populations and identify effective solutions to pollination-related challenges.
19. Taylor Kyte, a consultant lobbyist with Global Public Affairs Inc, is lobbying Member(s) of the BC Legislative Assembly and public office holders at the Ministry of Housing and Municipal Affairs on behalf of Canadian Standards Association regarding the adoption of standards into regulation, policy,

guidelines, or funding criteria, policy recommendations, and requests for funding that would support standards, research, or education in the areas of transportation and accessibility, and seeking funding for standards in training in modular high-rise construction.

20. Michael McKinnon, a consultant lobbyist with Enterprise Canada, is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of PTI Transformers Inc. regarding opportunities to support increased domestic manufacturing of electrical transformers and secure supply chains for British Columbia's electricity grid.
21. Michael McKinnon, a consultant lobbyist with Enterprise Canada, is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of EllisDon Inc. regarding communicating EllisDon's leadership in workplace health and safety across Canada and seeking opportunities to work together with government, industry associations, and regulators to advance higher standards, improve training, and promote safer worksites, as well as discussing EllisDon's experience delivering major projects and opportunities to support public infrastructure priorities in B.C.
22. Tyler Pronyk, a consultant lobbyist with Coast Communications and Public Affairs, is lobbying public office holders at the Ministry of Education and Child Care and at the Ministry of Water, Land and Resource Stewardship on behalf of Whistler Waldorf School Society to advocate for a temporary licence extension on a provincial Crown grant in Whistler to bridge the gap until the permanent campus for the Whistler Waldorf School is completed and ready for child care and K–12 programming.
23. Josie Sabatino, a consultant lobbyist with Summa Strategies Canada Inc. is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of Hockey Canada regarding collaboration on infrastructure projects to address aging and inadequate facilities across the Province of British Columbia; the current landscape of hockey facilities and reimagining how they operate; the development of a nation-wide strategy for the future of hockey in Canada, including how each province and territory can contribute; and how Hockey Canada can best support the growth of hockey in British Columbia.
24. Darielle Segovia, a consultant lobbyist with Counsel Public Affairs Inc., is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of the Horse Council of British Columbia regarding the continuation of horses being classified as livestock, discussion of provincial sport funding and how the lack of funding growth to keep pace with inflation is causing PSOs to consider program cuts and/or service level reductions and updating the revenue thresholds for farm classification.

25. Claire Smith, a consultant lobbyist with Summa Strategies Canada Inc., is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of Canadian Cardiovascular Society regarding promoting best practices and federal-provincial collaboration on cardiovascular care policy, the paucity and inaccessibility of data and seeking a resolution, and to seek funding from the provincial government to support cardiovascular care programming.
26. Andrew Sennyah, a consultant lobbyist with Crestview Strategy, is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of CINEPLEX ENTERTAINMENT LIMITED PARTNERSHIP regarding seeking access to alcohol licensing for movie theatres and a more favourable film classification environment for film exhibitors.
27. Samira Wagner, a consultant lobbyist with Crestview Strategy, is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies on behalf of SkipTheDishes Restaurant Services Inc. regarding policy discussions and advocacy regarding labour policies and regulatory frameworks affecting app-based and gig workers, including worker protections, and labour relations, as well as regarding Skip's pricing methodology and ensuring policies support consumers and local businesses.
28. The Burnaby Teachers' Association is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies regarding adequate funding of public education, student learning conditions, and teacher working conditions.
29. Cohere Inc. is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies regarding policies related to the adoption of AI technologies and related support services.
30. Coquitlam Teachers' Association is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies regarding student learning conditions and teaching conditions, individualized autism funding being phased out, and curriculum changes, available resources, timelines, in-service, materials, collaboration time, data gathering assessments and communication.
31. Delta Forestry Group is lobbying public office holders at Forestry Innovation Investment Ltd. and the Ministry of Forests regarding forest policies and regulations affecting the coastal forest industry and coastal communities.
32. Glencore Canada Corporation is lobbying public office holders at the Ministry of Mining and Critical Minerals regarding legacy asset permits.
33. International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Canada is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies regarding energy, labour, and human rights policy directly impacting the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers' membership and broader industries, including but not limited to

construction, telecommunications, utilities, transportation, manufacturing, government, healthcare, and defence, in both the public and private sectors.

34. Innomar Strategies Inc. is lobbying public office holders at the Provincial Health Services Authority regarding changes to policies or programs related to the Expensive Drugs for Rare Diseases (EDRD) program, including pharmacy participation, reimbursement, dispensing, distribution, and related program requirements for rare disease therapies.
35. Junior Achievement of British Columbia (JABC) is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies to discuss funding opportunities for JA British Columbia, including seeking funding or advice on available funding opportunities, in an effort to garner support to expand the reach of its programs and positively impact more of British Columbia's youth.
36. Pacific Institute for Sport Excellence Society is lobbying Member(s) of the BC Legislative Assembly and public office holders at the Ministry of Tourism, Arts, Culture and Sport to seek funding for infrastructure renewal.
37. Retail Council of Canada is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies regarding amendments to Section 8(2)(f) of the Recycling Regulation to clarify that all producer responsibility agencies with approved stewardship plans are required to publish independently audited financial statements; addressing inequity (and free-riders) in the extended producer responsibility regime under the Recycling Regulation by increasing compliance and enforcement, and changes to policy directives from the Ministry of Environment and Parks; amendment of the Bicycle Safety Helmet Standards Regulation to include the relevant European Union standard; ensuring that the extended producer responsibility regime, as part of the Recycling Regulation, is affordable to consumers and businesses and that operating impacts to businesses do not continue to substantially increase the cost of doing business in British Columbia by achieving amendments to the Recycling Regulation that (a) require all Producer Responsibility Organizations (PROs) to publicly report financial and non-financial results, (b) achieve a level playing field by increasing compliance by those businesses not registering, reporting, and remitting for the packaging and products that they introduce to the British Columbia market (principally foreign-based entities), (c) require that all recyclable products and packaging either be managed consistently with best environmental outcomes or returned to the PRO with an approved extended producer responsibility plan for processing consistent with the approved plan, and (d) ensure packaging and paper products (inclusive of canisters and cylinders) are included in Schedule 5; increasing government action to address retail crime and safety, including organized

retail crime, through (a) more resources for policing, (b) speedier, more impactful prosecution of offenders to end the same store employees being victimized multiple times in short time spans, and (c) significantly more effort to stem organized retail crime and the resale of goods, including through unregulated online marketplaces; and reform of the Labour Relations Board, not limited to positions, succession planning, compensation and benefits; establishing conditions for recruitment and retention of expert board members; forming or expanding an expert advisory committee to provide recommendations, advice, and support to the Ministry of Labour on succession planning and recruitment; and providing support to the Board for (i) improved performance standards, (ii) continuing board development, education, and training, (iii) increased regular exchange of common issues, developments, and industry and labour perspectives between the Board, employers, and labour, and (iv) more effective and timely case management to allow certainty and predictability.

38. SUMS Place Society is lobbying public office holders at the British Columbia Housing Management Commission and Member(s) of the BC Legislative Assembly regarding funding for emergency shelter operations in the Central Surrey area.
39. United Flower Growers Cooperative Association is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies regarding updating the revenue thresholds for farm classification, increasing the list of items included in the PST exemption list for Agriculture, encouraging the Government to work with industry to ensure long term access to water, and encouraging the Government to work with industry to avoid further cost pressures on the sector.
40. WINE GROWERS BRITISH COLUMBIA SOCIETY is lobbying public office holders at several public agencies regarding amendments to regulations for activation of previously dormant, trade-protected off-site store licences; amendments to regulations for BC LCRB license and BC LDB distribution agreements to recognize and treat all certified 100% BC wine as equal; amendments to regulations to increase the floor price for all alcohol products; amendments to regulations to make permanent liquor manufacturers ability to deliver their liquor products directly to retail customers from their registered off-site storage facility(s); direct sale of wine above a wholesale price level; funding for a long-term BC Wine Tourism Strategy; improved Agriculture Land Commission Policies; recommendations for market research and development of a consumer marketing and public relations campaign to encourage BC residents to shift from imports to BC wines; recommendations for wine grape replant program; regulatory Changes to Temporary Expanded Service Areas for BC Wineries; responsible Consumption of Wine Campaign; seeking assistance for climate related damage

to grapes and vineyards and consequential short crops; seeking to safeguard existing industry support programs offered through the Liquor Distribution Branch and related Ministries of Agriculture, Finance and Solicitor General; support the temporary ability for BC wineries to import grapes, juice or wine from outside of BC with the regulatory changes to be eligible for temporary markup and rebate concessions; placement of Wine on Public Liquor Store Shelves through the Liquor Distribution Board; offset impacts of Federal Excise Tax on Support Programs; obtain government assistance for climate-related crop damage (including freeze damage), adjustments to financial support programs, and removal of limitations such as the Olympic Average Sales Cap; modernize Sales Agreement between wine producers and the Liquor Distribution Branch; and modernize BC Industry Licensing Regime.
